

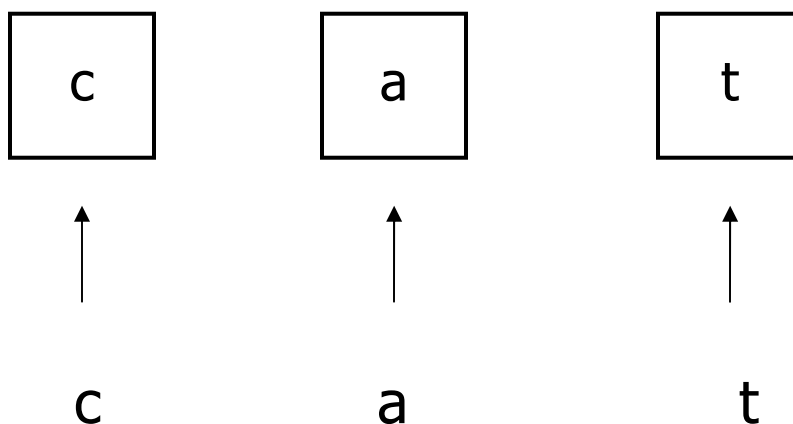
HOME SUPPORT: BLENDING SOUNDS TO MAKE NEW WORDS

Blending sounds to make new words is when your child begins to understand the relationship between the **sounds** of spoken language – phonemes – and how the letters and spellings of words represent those sounds in **written** language.

Tapping the sounds helps. Have our child tap his or her finger to their thumb while saying each sound of a word. For example, say the word "cat". While tapping the index finger to the thumb, say the sound /k/. Then tap the pointer finger to the thumb while saying the /ă/ sound. Next, tap the ring finger to the thumb while saying the /t/ sound. Finally, say the entire word "cat".

Suggestions For Blending Sounds To Make New Words:

- Play – A – Game: Find A Word
Use the magnetic letters on the refrigerator, Scrabble® letters, Bananagrams®, or make your own cut up letters stored in a plastic bag. Have your child use the letters to make four different words, tapping out the sounds and reading the words.
- Play – A – Game: Build A Word
Using the letters your child has stored, write a word on a piece of paper placing a single letter inside a box as modeled below. Have your child find the matching letter and place it under the box of the correct letter. Together say the sound of the letter as your child pushes the letter upward. Finally, after the letters are placed read the word.
