

Dear North Shore Families,

As you may have seen over the weekend, an email was sent to certain community members that contained false and defamatory information.

This email that I am writing to you now contains only factual information.

In early October, the District began to receive emails asking for an independent budget review. At the same time, the District began to receive emails opposed to an independent budget review.

In order to bring the community together and find a way forward, I emailed those who asked for the review and asked them specifically what they were looking for in a review. Based on those responses from residents and discussions with our Central Office and Board of Education on what information would be most helpful to find greater efficiencies, we developed an outline for a budget study that was focused on comparisons to other districts and per-pupil spending as we were genuinely interested in finding efficiencies. The Board then approved a contract for the independent business review.

As the report was in draft form and was not complete on February 8, it was an intra-agency document and only portions of the report would be disclosed under New York State law. The draft report that was posted after the request was reviewed by the District's legal counsel and provided back to the District. That is the version that is posted currently until the final version is completed and followed the process that a school district would for any draft report.

In addition, the content of the full draft report, including recommendations for cuts, was presented in person and on live stream at the Board of Education meeting on February 8th, 2024. In fact, the District invited Mr. Dragone to present to the Board on 2/8 and discuss his full report and recommendations. Please see the video of this presentation at:

Draft reports are routinely posted in final form after they are discussed publicly so they can then take into account the questions that arise in public comment and in the Board Discussion. After the 2/8 meeting, we spent several hours watching the video of the 2/8 meeting and consolidated that information into new requests for the independent budget reviewer who has been working on them. That report should be completed this week, and the final version will be posted when it is completed.

As you know, I have organized a series of pre-budget adoption meetings with all stakeholders in the community to answer questions and listen to their concerns, so this can be relayed to the Board before the budget is adopted. In those meetings, exact facts and figures like class sizes and potential savings are openly discussed.

As I have outlined in all of these presentations, the community has a difficult decision to make. Like all of Nassau County, taxes continue to rise. However, the shift in taxes due to the loss of tax revenue from LIPA is a unique situation and added burden for North Shore taxpayers. At the same time, parents have told me that they moved to North Shore in the last few years for the opportunities and small class sizes.

I encourage you to contact the Board of Education and me with your questions and thoughts on how to best move forward.

Last year, all budgets were held flat, and the following was cut from the budget:


\$2.7 Million was cut last year and all budgets in departments were held flat:

- 3 Administrators
- 19 Teachers


- 5 TA's
- 5 Paraprofessionals
- 2 Clerical

This year, we are proposing to cut an additional 9 teaching positions (\$1.1 Million) and a cut of 5 paraprofessionals and other non-instructional cuts (\$1.4 Million) (all departmental budgets were cut) for a total of 48 positions over 2 years (28 of which are teaching positions).

Over the last two years, the district has made \$5.2 Million in cuts (\$2.7 Million last year and a proposed \$2.5 Million this year) and has increased use of reserves, state aid, tuition and earned interest by over \$6.24 Million over the past two years to handle an \$18 Million combined two year deficit resulting from the loss of revenue from LIPA and loss of grants, increasing health care costs, fuel, heat, transportation and other inflationary based (non-discretionary) increases.



## BUDGET PRESSURES & DISTRICT EFFORTS - 2024



The independent budget report did help to confirm where these proposed cuts could work by increasing class sizes for students. Based on community feedback, the direction to make additional cuts would be informed by the report and student scheduling and enrollment data. Further cuts would require increasing class sizes at the elementary level and/or eliminating certain programs or options for students.

Here is the projected impact on personal property taxes based on different tax levy amounts:
