North Shore Schools Board of Education Regular Meeting Minutes December 1, 2022

The meeting was called to order by President David Ludmar at 6:30 p.m. in the Glenwood Landing Elementary School Auditorium. Present were Trustees Cashman, Colacioppo, Macari and Mosca. Trustee Galati and Russo were absent. Also present were Superintendent Dr. Christopher Zublionis and Assistant Superintendents Dr. Carol Smyth and Mr. James Pappas.

At 6:30 p.m. on motion of Trustee Macari and seconded by Trustee Colacioppo and all in favor, the Board convened an executive session in room 101 to discuss matters regarding the employment or appointment of a particular person or persons, collective negotiations pursuant to Article 14 of the Civil Service Law (the Taylor Law) and proposed pending or current litigation.

At 7:45 p.m. on motion of Trustee Cashman and seconded by Trustee Mosca and all in favor, the Board came out of executive session and resumed the regular meeting in the auditorium. There were approximately 100 people in the audience.

## Pledge of Allegiance

President Ludmar led the public in the pledge of allegiance.

### **Student Recognition**

On behalf of the Board, President Ludmar and Dr. Zublionis recognized the following students: Norah Davison for being named to the American Choral Director's Association National Conference for Treble Honor Choir; the Girls' Volleyball Team who made it to the Nassau County Finals; both the Women's and Men's Cross-Country Teams who won the Nassau County Championships as well as the Varsity Football Team who also became Nassau County Champions.

## **Approval of the Minutes**

The reading of the draft minutes of the meetings of November 10, 2022, being prepared and disseminated to all members in advance of the meeting, was dispensed. There being no corrections to the minutes, it was declared by President Ludmar that the minutes of the Regular meeting of November 10, 2022 and the Audit Committee Meeting of November 10, 2022 were approved.

# **Approval of Treasurer Report**

Prior to approval, President Ludmar noted under the revenue report there is excess revenue in the school lunch fund. He also noted that from the independent audit corrective action plan one of the three things to be resolved this year is the deficit in school lunch fund. He asked if the excess revenue would help to resolve that. Mr. Pappas responded that would be resolved by the end of the year. President Ludmar remarked that the first 2 items in the corrective action plan have already been resolved and once the school lunch fund is resolved, all three will be completed. Section 2. This resolution is effective immediately upon its enactment by the North Shore Board of Education.

## Report from the SGO – 8:40 p.m.

SGO Co-Presidents Michael Fleming and Samantha Lockwood reported on events and activities at the high school, including: The Mock Trial Team won the Pretrial tournament – one of 5 schools in the tournament and then won the final trial. The production of *Inherit the Wind* was very successful. Auditions for the spring musical *Urinetown* will be held next week. The SGO will be decorating the school for the Holidays and will holding "Ugly Sweater Day" the day before the break.

## Report of the Superintendent – 8:45 p.m.

Dr. Zublionis reported that Food Services Director, Alan Levin, recently met with the Farm to School coordinators from the Cornell Cooperative Extension and discussed their Choose Local F.I.S.H initiative. He explained that we are interested in becoming their pilot school for this program which would make us the first district in New York to serve seafood. The plan is to serve 2 types of Long Island fish chowder in a bread bowl on February 2 at the high school. The CCE representatives will set up a "seafood literacy" presentation and tasting event in the cafeteria to educate the students on Long Island Seafood.

Next, Dr. Zublionis reported that the Glen Head Community Club delivered 68 bags of food & nonperishable items to "NOSH" in Glen Cove which included delicious and nutritious side dishes for Thanksgiving. Ms. Christine Kingsley remarked that "not only were we thrilled to deliver 68 "fixin" bags but we also provided six overflowing boxes of other nonperishable food items. We are so grateful for Glen Head's generous students who donated all of the food to bring to local families." Club officers joined Ms. Kingsley and Ms. Janet Goldberg as they made the delivery to NOSH.

The Key Club held a successful blood drive with 47 donors which saved 141 lives. Students were reminded how to prepare for donating, and each student received 40 minutes of service time if they

donated on a free period. In addition, the Key Club has adopted Mommas House as their MEP Project for the year. They provided a Thanksgiving Feast on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving and groups of members had responsibilities such as doing arts/crafts with the children, reading to them, serving the meal, cleaning up. It was a huge success for all.

Dr. Zublionis reported that E3Day, the day before the Thanksgiving Break was a wonderful and inspiring day for the Middle School. Everyone celebrated E3 together making a positive difference in the lives of others. North Shore Middle School E3 day is where Everyone Matters, Everyone Cares, Everyone Learns (E3). Annually on E3 Day, middle school students are encouraged to learn about themselves and others while thinking about ways they can make a positive difference in their school, community, and in places around the world. Principal Dr. Ryan O'Hara said, "E3 Day is a yearly tradition at North Shore Middle School that reminds us of just how much we can do when we work together to make our world better for each other. During the course of the day, students, faculty and staff engaged in numerous activities and fundraising events, some of which were off-site opportunities for our students and community outside of the school." Some of these were: Miles for Smiles, Elementary Teacher for the Day, Read-a-Thon, E3 Refreshment Stand Sale, Fight Hard, Smile Big (Pedone Basketball and Football), E3 Mural Painting/Beautification of the School, Organic Gardening, Gifts for Foster Kids, Cards for Soldiers, 3 on 3 Basketball, Turkey Football Bowl, Cove Animal Shelter, Cove Senior Citizen Chorus Performance, Cards of Love for Hospitalized Children, Black Tuesday Fundraiser.

Dr. Zublionis remarked on how well our student did on the ELA and Math assessments. He explained that later in the evening we will speaking about student achievement in physical education, athletics, health and fine and performing arts. Dr. Zublionis spoke about the fact that there has been a recent spike in online behavior and he wanted to note they are concerned with every incident and there will be a focus on digital citizenship. He went on to say when things happen outside of school they do have consequences and online behavior can have long lasting consequences. He wants to work together with the community on this issue.

Finally, Dr. Zublionis gave an update on Universal Pre-K. He is looking to bring a vendor into North Shore, a partner that others have used. He will send out a survey tomorrow to see how many parents are interested. The Board will need to act on the RFP; only one response was received. The plan is to start possibly on February 1 for a ½ year session. Children will need to be 4 years of age by December 1, 2022 and residents of the District. Depending on interest, there may need to be a lottery for attendance. There are a lot of strings attached to the funding, and we do not know yet if those funds will come again next year. There are still a lot of unknowns and he thanks the Board for their patience.

# Student Achievement-Part 1: Fine and Performing Arts and Physical Education and Athletics – 8:50 p.m.

Fine and Performing Arts Director Dalia Rodriguez gave an overview of the programs offered K-12 and highlighted student performance, enrollment and achievement. Four high school students shared their experiences in different aspects of the fine and performing arts program.

Don Lang, Director of Athletics, Health and Physical Education reviewed all of the programs running throughout his department K-12. He too highlighted the many offerings and student successes on and off the athletic field and the changes that have taken place in the health and physical education curriculum. Three high school student athletes shared their experiences. One student shared that in his view the turf field needs to be addressed so students are not concerned about their safety when playing on it.

The Board discussed the two presentations. All Trustees agreed that hearing directly from students is important and impactful. They were all impressed with the presentations and felt they reflected the North Shore philosophy of innovation and critical thinking. Some concern was raised over how to increase participation in both programs and investigating why special education students cannot

participate. Suggestions for supporting the programs to expand them, pushing the dance program down to the elementary level, increasing instrument lessons, increasing intramurals at the middle school. A suggestion was made to be clear in the budget narrative for what is needed and why it is needed.

President Ludmar remarked that the student successes are due to great teachers who are innovating and motivating. He said it is critical to bring more kids into the process, to foster the development and growth of all kids as much as possible.

President Ludmar explained this came up in construction steering and he agrees the cost is very frustrating. He further explained that it is very different than building in private industry, it cost much more. Trustee Cashman further explained that this was bid out and was not the most expensive bid, she also reminded the public it is totally covered by insurance. The building is used as a workshop for district-wide projects and ultimately saves the district money.
