Board of Education
Regular Meeting
Minutes
October 9, 2025

The meeting was called to order by President Andrea Macari at 6:30 p.m. in the Middle School Cafeteria. Present were Trustees Cashman, Colacioppo, Dillon, Hanley, Mosca and Svendsen. Also present were Superintendent Dr. Christopher Zublionis and Assistant Superintendents Dr. Carol Smyth and Mr. James Pappas.

At 6:30 p.m. on motion of Trustee Colacioppo and seconded by Trustee Hanley and all in favor, the Board convened an executive session in the library to consider matters leading to the appointment or employment of a particular person or persons, and proposed, pending or current litigation.

At 8:00 p.m. on motion of Trustee Hanley and seconded by Trustee Cashman and all in favor, the Board came out of executive session and resumed the regular meeting in the cafeteria. There were approximately 25 people in the audience.

Pledge of Allegiance

President Macari led the public in the pledge of allegiance. ASL students signed the pledge.

Approval of Minutes

The reading of the draft minutes of the meeting of September 18, 2025 being prepared and disseminated to all members in advance of the meeting, were dispensed. There being no corrections to the minutes, it was declared by President Macari that the minutes of the meeting of September 18, 2025 were approved.

Recognition of Students

Report from the Ex-Officio Student Board Members

Luna Espinosa De Roza and Genevieve Hudin reported on events and activities at the high school. They updated the Board on the effects of the NYS Phone Ban Policy. They reported that the policies regarding the phone ban have been holding up well, but there has been a growing range of opinions surrounding the ban itself. Students have expressed concerns, particularly regarding communication challenges: student-athletes often face last minute changes to practice or game schedules, and without access to their phones, they may not receive these updates from their coaches until after school because communication is done via *GroupMe*. Also, seniors have shared their disappointment about missing opportunities to capture meaningful moments during key events such as the last Halloween at North Shore, Commitment Day, and Senior Assassin. While they understand that the phone ban is mandated at the state level, they believe that somehow shifting the communication norm and communicating atmosphere to be through email, with the help of teachers, can also ease students into the habit of regularly communicating through email and checking their email. If the atmosphere changes, so will the actions of students. Next the student members reported that the student body has expressed significant appreciation for the academic support available at school. Many students have noted that their teachers consistently go above and beyond to provide assistance, whether through individual help sessions or resources such as the Math Center and the Writing Center. Seniors, in particular, have expressed gratitude toward the English Department for offering one-on-one meetings to review college essays, support that has helped alleviate a great deal of stress during the college application process. At the same time, some juniors have voiced a desire for expanded resources related to ACT/SAT preparation. The Writing Center is currently exploring ways to meet this need. Beyond academics, students are also pleased with the variety of community service opportunities available through organizations such as Key Club, Interact Club, Dr. Chimeri's Community Service Google Classroom, and the upcoming Hall-O-Ween event on October 30. Regarding Hall-O-Ween, each grade is looking forward to decorating their designated hallways and helping create a memorable Halloween experience for the elementary students. However, there remains some questions regarding how to properly use the "Passport for Good" platform to log community service and club hours. Clarifying this process would further support students in tracking their involvement and contributions. Luna and Genevieve reported that the students are very excited for Homecoming next week, and the student body is very pleased and excited to participate in next week's spirit week themes which are as follows: Tuesday, Country vs Country Club, Wednesday, Duo/ Character Day, Thursday, USA Day, and Friday, North Shore Spirit Day. The students next updated the Board on Extra Curriculars. They reported that students have expressed immense gratitude for having a wide variety of clubs and sports to choose from, and they say this allows them to find communities within the school that share their particular interest. However, touching upon the last meeting, there are also too many afterschool activities for students to choose from. This doesn't only create extreme overlaps on club meetings, but it also tends to make students overbook their schedules and thus take on too many activities they can't handle. Finally, Luna and Genevieve reported that they have received numerous requests from the student body (particularly from student-athletes) regarding the installation of lights on the turf field. Many athletes have expressed that this has been a long-standing request, as they are eager to have the opportunity to practice and play games under well-lit conditions.

Dr. Zublionis will bring up the communication issue at athletic advisory and with the athletic booster club. He has spoken with the Director of Technology about lifting some of the filters on email, so he is working on that issue. He said he understands students feel they need to be a part of multiple club activities for various reasons, one being the college application, however there is a limit on the number of clubs students can put into the college common app. He reported that the students' dance request is being discussed; hoping for a November dance.

Report of the Superintendent

Dr. Zublionis and Dr. Smyth attended the Tri-M Induction ceremony last evening. It was student led with an amazing keynote who is a theatre teacher in the community, and amazing performances. He thanked the music faculty and Ms. Rodriguez and the whole music and fine and performing arts faculty. Dr. Zublionis next reported on a meeting of the Viking Community Committee, an instructional committee at North Shore. They held their first meeting and are focusing on 3 subcommittee topics this year: Elementary Science Fair, led by Dr. Smyth; Mentoring (student-to-student mentoring and adult mentorships), led by Dr. O'Hara and Dr. Mabrouk; and Internships and Community Service, led by Dr. Zublionis. Dr. Zublionis is building a catalog of who is available to host internships and community service, and he is also looking at insurance requirements for when students go out in the field. Dr. Zublionis reported that Unity Day will be recognized next Wednesday; everyone is encouraged to wear orange. It is a day to celebrate kindness, acceptance and Inclusion throughout the community. Dr. Zublionis reported that everyone is excited about Homecoming, scheduled for Saturday, October 18. Scheduled is the first ever Alumni Brunch at 10:00 a.m., Fan Fest/Carnival/Sports Clinics also begin at 10:00 a.m. and the Varsity Football Game against East Rockaway begins at 2:00 p.m. The annual Viking Walk will take place on Friday, October 17; senior varsity athletes visit their elementary schools. Finally, Dr. Zublionis reported that the middle school winter sports virtual meetings will be held next week, varsity football will be away this week at Carle Place, under the lights, and Girls Varsity Tennis will have a playoff match on Friday.

Regular Business

Discussion: Capital Projects – 8:35 p.m.

Dr. Zublionis, along with Assistant Superintendent for Business, James Pappas and Director of Facilities, Matthew Backes, reviewed a capital improvement plan beginning with the goals for the plan: ensuring our students have the proper places and spaces to learn, play and grow; that we maintain the properties in the most efficient way for the community; and to ensure that buildings and learning spaces meet statewide mandates for health and safety. They explained that 2026 presents a window within which to plan and budget for consistent, regularized bond payments and other capital expenses, some facilities are near the end of its useful life and new state mandates require capital investments. They reviewed the timeline beginning with research and pre-budgeting, preliminary planning, final planning and finally a bond and capital reserve vote in the spring of 2026. During the Pre-2025 phase, they identified initial concerns and used existing funds to make capital improvements while creating budget spaces for future capital projects and conducted research. These included capital projects meetings, conducting a community survey and a public board presentation. The survey indicated that the most important project is stadium lights, followed by large space A/C and finally stadium bleachers. They spoke about the projects identified as most important, how to fund them and when a vote can be taken. The projects include: North Shore High School Track and Bleachers; High School Stadium Field Lighting; High School Fields; Glen Head School Gathering Room Renovation; Middle School Field Resurfacing and Drainage; Large Space Air Conditioning (Sea Cliff Auditorium and Gym; Glenwood Landing Gym and Cafeteria; Glen Head Gym and Gathering Room; Middle School Gym); High School Theater Ceiling and Updated Large Space A/C. Approximate costs, funding sources, funding structures, and voting

structures were reviewed. Their recommendation is to fund the track and stadium lights through the existing capital reserve, and all other projects through a bond. This will require a vote by the community and it is their recommendation to hold one vote in February of 2026.

The Board discussed the presentation. Trustees were supportive of funding the projects with the capital reserve and bond and expressed that this is the fiscally responsible way to fund infrastructure. It was noted that a vast number of students play a sport, and they are either playing in the dark or games are postponed because of dark. It was also noted that studies show injuries are caused by students going back and forth from playing on surfaces of grass and/or turf. The importance of remaining tax neutral was expressed. Revisiting the remaining projects in the 2016 Capital Reserve was requested. Concern was expressed about the cost of redesigning the high school fields considering the possible financial cliff the District may face soon. It was noted that Athletic Field Quality and Maintenance was the 2nd most important theme from the survey. It was suggested to add new bleachers to the tennis court area. All Trustees agreed with holding one vote, in February.

Comments from the Public—9:55 PM

Joanna Clancy, GH, thanked the Board for supporting the Booster Club. She said the Booster Club is in full support of all the projects being recommended and they do understand the concerns regarding the designs of the fields. She explained that it is hard to schedule practice and games with one turf field, and a second turf field would benefit the students. She said it is important to promote that the bond will be tax neutral. She said that 70% of students play sports and they don't have adequate fields, or lighting, which is unfair to them. She went on to say that the Board speaks about equity, and giving students what they need, however student athletes are not being given what they need to play. Finally, Ms. Clancy asked for a net behind the goal post for when the extra point is kicked.

Ally Weiss Begley, Glen Head, thanked the Board for the proposed plans. She said her son will not benefit from the changes, but she is hopeful for future student-athletes. She explained that it is hard for the athletes to manage using one turf field and said the extra turf field would be beneficial to the students. She feels this is the time and "if not now, then when." She thanked the Board for volunteering and for being a good partner.

Approval of a SEQRA Resolution for Proposed Capital Projects

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the North Shore Central School District (“the District”) desires to embark upon the following improvements at the District’s facility as set forth herein and as listed in the working budget: (1) site work including the resurfacing of the existing running track, installation of new sports lighting to the athletic field, replacement of the existing bleachers with ADA improvements, and all supporting electrical, plumbing, and structural requirements at the North Shore High School, (hereinafter referred to as the “Project”); and

WHEREAS, said capital improvement are subject to classification under the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA); and

WHEREAS, installation of new sports lighting to the athletic field at the North Shore High School is not classified as a Type I Action or Type II Action as determined under the current Department of Environmental Conservation SEQR Regulations (Section 6 NYCRR 617.4 and 617.5; and

WHEREAS, for Unlisted Actions the lead agency making a determination of significance must: (1) consider the action as defined in Sections 617.2(b) and 617.3(g); (2) review the EAF, the criteria contained in Section 617.7(c) and any other supporting information to identify the relevant areas of environmental concern; (3) thoroughly analyze the identified relevant areas of environmental concern to determine if the action may have a significant adverse impact on the environment; and (4) set forth its determination of significance in a written form containing a reasoned elaboration and providing reference to any supporting documentation; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education, as the only involved agency, has examined all information related to the capital improvement project and has determined that the Project is classified as an Unlisted Action and determined pursuant to Section 617.7(c) of the SEQRA Regulations that the Project will have no significant adverse impact on the environment; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Education hereby declares itself lead agency in connection with the requirements of the State Environmental Quality Review Act; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Education hereby declares that the Project is an Unlisted Action, with a Negative Declaration which require no further review under SEQRA. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Education hereby shall forward an official copy of this Resolution to the New York State Education Department.

Approval of a Resolution Authorizing Participation in a RIC One Risk Operations Center "ROC"

WHEREAS, four (4) BOCES (Onondaga-Cortland-Madison BOCES, Albany-Schoharie-Schenectady-Saratoga BOCES, Madison-Oneida BOCES and Broome-Tioga BOCES) have collaborated and entered into an Article 5 General Municipal Law intermunicipal arrangement for the purpose of improving vendor management and data security and privacy practices for school districts and/or BOCES statewide known as the RIC ONE Risk Operations Center (the "ROC");

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the North Shore Central School District, through its affiliation with a locally based Regional Information Center, participates with the ROC and desires, for the 2025-2026 fiscal year, to authorize the ROC to enter into Data Privacy Agreements and related exhibits (DPAs) with vendors and third-party contractors that include the requirements of, and compliance with, New York State Education Law Section 2-d and Part 121 Regulations (collectively, "Ed Law 2d") related to student personally identifiable information (PII) and certain Teacher and Principal APPR data;

WHEREAS, the ROC also partners with NYSED, the Access4Learning Student Data Privacy Consortium (SDPC) and The Education Cooperative (TEC), to negotiate and approve Ed Law 2-d compliant DPAs;

WHEREAS, the DPAs are presented to school districts and/or BOCES for final execution and do not require the expenditure of funds beyond those budgeted; and

BE IT RESOLVED, Board of Education of the North Shore Central School District authorizes the attorneys designated by the ROC to negotiate and approve of DPAs for software and/or technology resources; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the North Shore Central School District Board of Education grants the ROC and its designated attorneys the authority to negotiate the terms and conditions of DPAs and take such actions so as to effectuate the purposes and intent of this resolution.
